What Parents & Carers Need to Know about

AI VIRTUAL FRIENDS

WHAT ARE THE RISKS? CONTENT AND ACCOUNTABILITY

Al chatbots may not always be able to recognise when content is oge inappropriate or harmful and should be littered out. So there's a possibility that children could be exposed to offensive language or explicit material while conversing with their virtual friend. The companies producing such Al solutions are also unlikely to take responsibility for any content that their algorithms generate.

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REDUCED SOCIAL CONTACT

for social interaction could potentially cause a child to begin reducing the amount of face-to-face communication the have, leading to social isolation. If young people become dependent on chatbots to provide companionship, it could very like had not the development of their read-life social skills.

LACK OF SENSITIVITY

Charbot sortwee is n't always sophisticated enough to pick up on subtle emotional aues or recognise eigns of distress in children, as most humans would. It might therefore lail to respond appropriately. Al misinterpreting what it's being told or replying insensitively to a young user who's already struggling oould potentially impact a child's emotional we'l being or exacerbate any axisting emotional issues.

Al companions are only as reliable as the information they we been programmed with. The algorithms they use, therefore, may unintentionally promote bias, stereotypes or discriminatory behaviour (as many originate from the USA or the UK, for instance, they can display a distinctly western-centric worldview). This could lead to children developing stewed attitudes and behaviours.

COGNITIVE LIMITATIONS

Although many are now underliably advanced. Al- powered charboth still have limitations in terms of understanding complex concepts, context and nuance. Depending heavily on charbots to help with learning or solving problems may stunt the development of a child's own powers of critical thinking creativity and ability to engage in open-ended discussions with other people.

PRIVACY CONCERNS

Chatbots typically collect data about user, including personal information and convertations. This is activably to improve their performance as they gradually learn about our behaviour — but many expects are warning that there may be significant risks associated with how this information is stored and used (the possibility of potential breaches or misuse by third parties, for instance.)



Advice for Parents & Carers

CHAT ABOUT CHATBOTS

If your child is already expressing an interest in All apps, a reloved, natural chait should help you to discover which ones they're aware of and how they're aware of and how they're aware of and how these options with your child and parhaps do your own research to ensure you think they're suitable. TAKE CONTROL

As with any form of upo or game, when it comes to Aj chatbots we'd strongly recommand that you consider employing parental controls (either on the device being used or within the software itself) to manage which apps your child can download and use. This is porticularly important for younger children, who may be more at risk of being upset or frightsered by inappropriate content.

Meet Our Expert

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RECOGNISE THE RISKS

Fix unlikely that most children will have even considered the potential risks attached to having a virtual companion. So it's probably wise to explain some of the possible hazards and challenges of Al chatbots to your child. In particular, emphasise that Al isn't a real person (however much it might sound like one) and may occasionally in! them something that isn't entirely importial or occurate.
